# **Course Description**

Student will learn to formulate linear programs and learn solution strategies such as the simplex method. Duality and sensitivity analysis also will be covered.

SIE 270 - Mathematical Foundations of Systems and Industrial Engineering.

Or an equivalent knowledge of linear algebra (systems of linear equations, matrix methods for solving systems of linear equations).

- Demonstrate an ability to choose an appropriate solution technique
- Extract relevant information from the model and solution

# **Grading Scale and Policies**

Homework (15%): 6 sets, the lowest homework grade will be dropped.

- The main purpose is to practice the skills needed to meet the learning outcomes for this course.
- o Homework assignments and due time will be posted in the Assignments section on D2L.
- 50% of the grade will be reduced for up to 24-hour late submission. No grade will be given for more than 24 hours late submission. Please communicate and coordinate any extension request directly with your instructor before the due dates. Late requests will not be considered.

**In-class Assignments** (5%): To ensure an engaged and interactive learning environment, 6 in-class assignments will occur at random class sessions.

- To account for unforeseen circumstances or challenging times, one lowest grade will be dropped. There will be no make-up for missed in-class assignments.
- If you attempt to solve the problem, regardless of whether the answer is correct or not, you will receive 100% for that assignment. However, if you choose not to attempt the problem, you will receive 50% as a participation score.

**Midterm exam 1** (20%): Thursday, October 2, 9:30 AM – 10:45 AM in our regular classroom.

**Midterm exam 2** (20%): Thursday, November 6, 9:30 AM – 10:45 AM in our regular classroom.

 The exams will be based on the material covered during lectures, homework, and the materials on D2L. Exams are closed book and only a basic (4-function) calculator is allowed.

**Final exam** (25%): Final exam is on Tuesday, December 16, 8:00 AM - 10:00 AM in our regular classroom and its format is similar to the midterm exams.

Class project: 15% (Team of 1-3 students, students need to use Excel, more details will be given in class).

Objective: Develop an appropriate linear programming model for a real-world problem and apply optimization techniques to solve the problem using Excel and analyzed the solution.
