- 1. Research Statement: Prepare a 1-2 page statement of your research interests. What are your interests? What are your goals? A faculty position? National Laboratory? Industry? Other?
- 2. Attendance: Attendance for this course in *highly* emphasized
- 3. Seminar Summary: For each seminar, a summary report is required. Each summary should provide an overview about the speaker; identify any specific information that you found relevant to your research, and other observations of interest. Each summary should be approximately ½ to 1 page in length and submitted to the course D2L site <u>before</u> the start of the seminar the following week. [<u>This rule is strictly enforced</u>]. In addition, if you are not in attendance in seminar, it is not possible for you to prepare a summary. Please do not submit a summary if you are not present in seminar.
